


QUILTING SUGGESTION Design "L"



This diagram, showing a corner of the quilt, illustrates a quilting plan taken from an old omit of this pattern. The dotted lines represent the quilting.


The applique figure is outlined with stitching, as shown above. A small feather pattern follows along the seam line of each block (between blocks only); also outline this feather pattern along a line drawn by hand just inside the scalloped border. A section of this feather, sufficient for marking the quilt as shown, is given below.

The lower half of each background is filled in with squares, formed by intersecting diagonal lines and easily marked with pencil and ruler. The upper portion of each block is quilted with parallel lines, a little closer together than the lines of the lower portion. Note that these lines run in different directions on alternate blocks.

That part of the border not guilted with the feather pattern is marked off with double parallel lines. Also the scalloped edge is outlined, as shown in the diagram.

If this quilting seems too elaborate to the modern quilt maker, we suggest that the main plan be followed, but with lines slightly farther spart than shown above. Thus the illusion of the real, old-fashioned quilt will remain,

Feather Section_Trace this outline, or paste it directly, onto cardboard. Then outline the upper curve of the pattern, continuously moving the pattern up the seam; turn pattern over to mark other side of feather. This pattern also marks the curved feather; shorten outline at corners.



NOTE: Make all pencil marks lightly, so that they can be removed with "Art Gum" eraser,

FOR A LARGER QUILT, measuring 81 x 96". do not join the blocks directly one to the other; set them together with white strips cut to finish 21/4" wide. These strips are used between all the blocks, but not completely around the quilt top; that is, when all the blocks have been joined with the white strips, attach similar strips along the sides of the quilt, since the additional width is needed; but do not attach strips across the top and bottom of the quilt, as this would make it too long when the white outer border and scallops had been added. In all, then, four strips 25%" wide run the length of the quilt; three strips run across (between blocks only). Piece the long strips; the ones running scross the quilt can be cut in three continuous strips.

This increases the size of the quilt top so that the outer white border (as shown on the diagram of the small quilt) will have to be longer, as well as the scalloped border. On the scalloped border, add one more scallop across (top and bottom of quilt), and one more along the length (sides); shorten the latter a trifle, since the incremed length is not quite 814" -the length of each scallop.

Yardage Required: Same as for small quilt, except provide 71/2 yds. White instead of yardage shown on chart. Provide additional material for back and binding.

We suggest that the featler quilting (shown on diagram of small quilt along block seams) be used on the white interblock border strips,

THE HARRISON ROSE

Design "L" of "The Mountain Mist Series" of Quilt Patterns An Applique Quilt


The Harrison Rose is a beautiful old pattern and one that quilt makers of today admire quite as much as did their grandmothers. The design itself has a quaint dignity, and the harmonizing, but lively colors add to this effect.

The quilt is composed of 12 blocks. To the left is seen the actual size pattern for the block. Below appears the border pattern, actual size. A diagram with the dimensions of the finished quilt is also given.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. First make cardboard patterns for all the parts, (note-only nine of these are needed, as several of the parts are identical in all but color). Thru thin paper trace an outline for each of the parts; paste these paper outlines onto cardboard. (the dress box kind is suitable); cut out the cardboard exactly on the pencilled outlines. Mark each part so made with its number, as shown on the original pattern.
- 2. If there is any doubt about the fastness of the color or if there is a possibility of shrinkage, first wash and iron the cloth. Now with a soft lead pencil putline the

- required number of cardboard patterns on each color of cloth, being careful to space the outlines far enough apart to allow for 1/4-inch seams when the pieces are cut out. (Exception: Do not mark the white cloth yet.) DO NOT CUT ALONG THESE LINES.
- 3. Now cut out the pieces or parts, allowing 14-inch for seams. Also cut twelve 18-inch sq. background blocks; these are to be cut from 3 yards of 35-inch material. Next cut the strips of white to go just inside the scalloped border, cutting first the two long, and then the two short strips; this leaves ample white material from which parts 10 and 12 and next marked and cut out.
- 4. Before appliqueing the parts, locate their positions by placing the full size figure for the block over one of the 18-inch squares of cloth so that the center of the pattern falls exactly on the center of the cloth. Pin the paper to the cloth, and using a soft pencil, indicate with dots the proper position of each part. Do this for all twelve blocks.
- 5. Before basting and appliqueing the pieces of cloth to the background, fold the turn-under and crease it with the finger nail along the pencilled lines. At this point it is also a good plan to notch the turn-under at the corners so that the pieces will lie flat. Baste and whip each part in place, whipping with thread of the same color as the part being appliqued. We suggest that parts be appliqued in this order; Part 3, part 6, followed by parts 7(a), 7 and 8, part 2, part 1, and parts 4 and 5.

6. When all twelve blocks are completed and set together, the white strips, and lastly the border, should be added. The border, of blossom colored and white scallops, will present no difficulty if it is carefully pieced. After piecing, set it onto the plain white strip surrounding the blocks. Now trim the hem of the white inner border to conform to the scallop shape. The quilt top, now completed, should at this point be pressed. 7. The final step is the actual quilting, which includes the fixing of the quilt back to the quilting frame; the spreading on of

the Mountain Mist Quilting Cotton; the laying on of the quilt top; the stretching and fastening of the entire quilt to the frame; the marking and stitching of the quilting design; and finally, the finishing of the edges of the quilt.



*Four pieces of Part 11, and four of Part 12 should be cut with the cardboard pattern upside down; thus, half face one way and half the other.
