Army Allows Race Meet at Fair Grounds

LANSING, Mich., May 1,-(P)-The Army will take over the State Fair grounds in Detroit May 15 "for the duration," allowing the 1942 horse racing program to proceed as scheduled, but hinting

broadly that there might be no more racing at the grounds until the war has ended.
