REFUND DEAL OFFERED CITY

Company Proposes To Handle Debt Revision at Cost of \$642,000.

Stranahan Harris & Co. will contract to arrange for the refunding of all of Detroit bonds beyond the \$125,000,000 worth that have already been accumulated by the bondholders refunding committee for a maximum charge of \$642,000, Robert S. Mikesell, vice-president, today informed the Council.

Mr. Mikesell appeared at his own request. He sent telegrams to councilmen Thursday representing that his firm could do the refunding job cheaper than the bondholders' committee.

The \$642,000 figure compares to the estimate of approximately \$800,000 furnished by the bondholders' committee, but David M. Wood, attorney for the committee, said before the Council that Stranahan Harris & Co. proposed to do only half of the job, whereas the committee proposes to undertake the full operation.
