Olsen has used While Mrs. nothing more than a hexagonal shaped piece for her pattern, she has arranged colors and materials to bring about a charming effect.

Instead of using just two rows around the center piece, she has filled out the large bexagon by having six rows. This makes it a large medallion and enough of these to make a good sized quilt have been arranged so that white diamond shaped pieces fill in the spaces. The diamond shaped pieces are also made of small white hexagonal patches.

IN THE entire quilt there are 3,795 pieces. The back is green. This same color has been used for the binding. When it was finished. she wanted to send it to her sister in England, but thinks she will wait until later so she can put it in the Detroit News quilt show. We hope invelope for a personal reply, and she brings all the quilts and tops that she has made.
