- Carrots Lyonnaise
- Spinach with Sour Cream
- Chinese Cabbage Salad

A few spices and a little vinegar turn an inexpensive cut of meat into a subtly flavored food.

### Spiced Flank Steak

One flank steak (about 1 1/2 pounds), 1/2 cup vinegar, 2 teaspoons salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 bay leaf, broken in small pieces. **STUFFING:** One cup cooked rice, 1 teaspoon chopped parsley, few grains salt, 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine.

Wipe the meat with a damp cloth and place in a deep container. Heat the remaining ingredients and pour over the meat. Let stand in the refrigerator for 8 hours or longer, turning meat several times. Combine the stuffing ingredients and

spread over the steak. Roll meat, and tie with cord. Brown on all sides in a little hot fat in a heavy kettle. Add enough water to almost cover it and simmer for about 2 hours or until tender. Serves 4.

### Carrots Lyonnaise

One bunch carrots, 1 medium sized onion, 3 tablespoons butter, margarine, or salad oil, salt, pepper, and sugar to taste.

Mince the onion and cook until brown in the fat. Add the thinly sliced carrots, cover pan tightly and cook over a low heat until tender. Season to taste with salt, pepper, and sugar. Serves 4.
