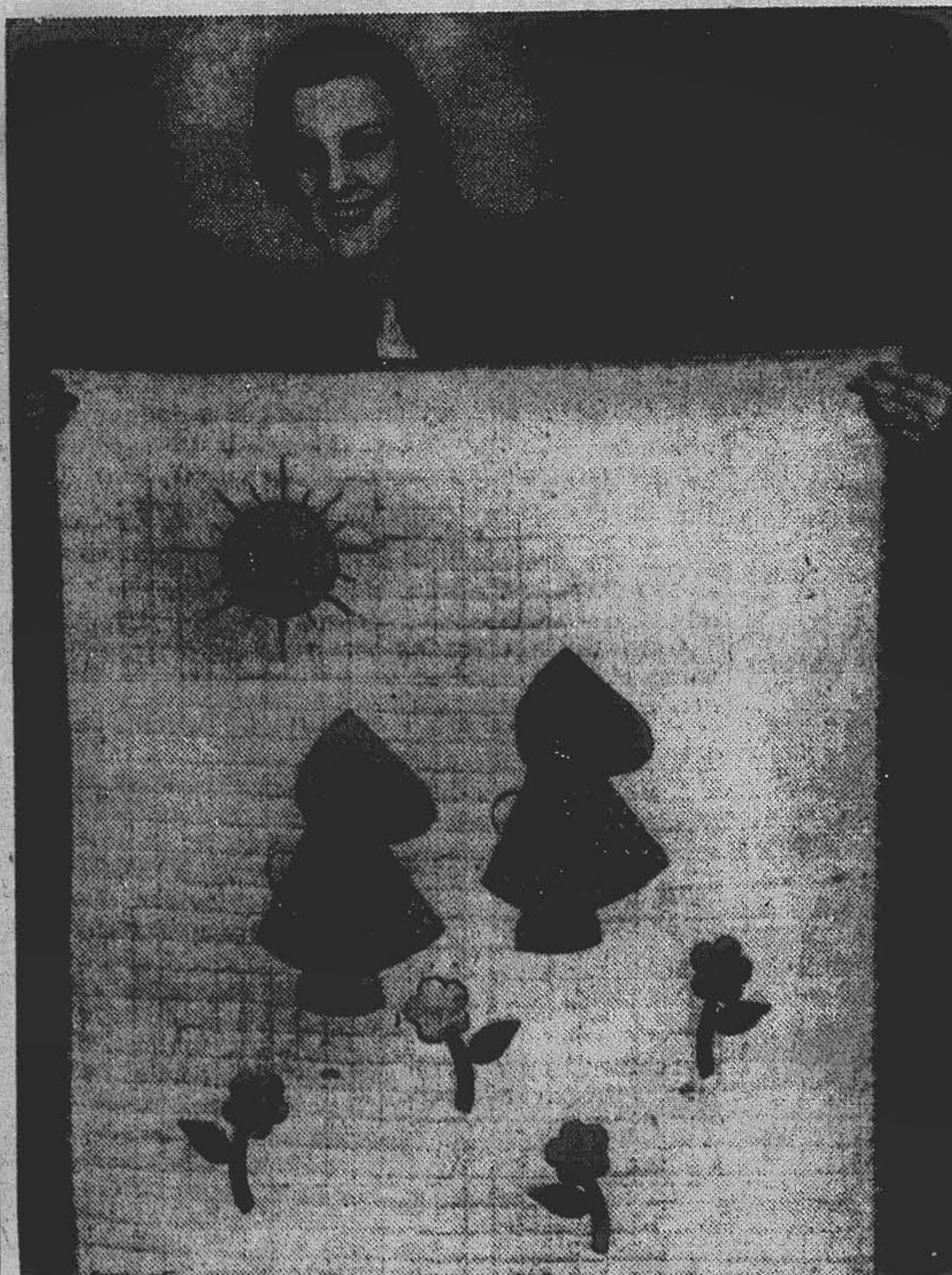
### BUDGET TIME

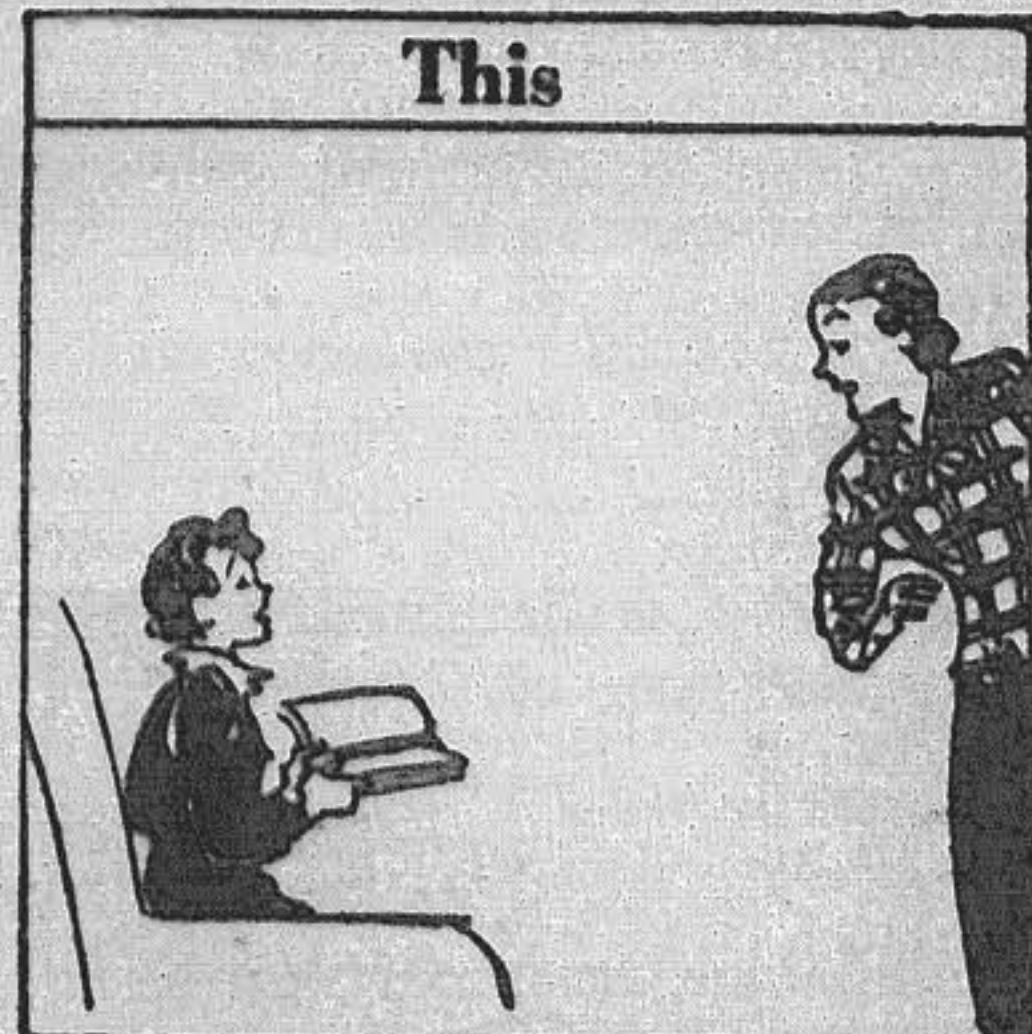
