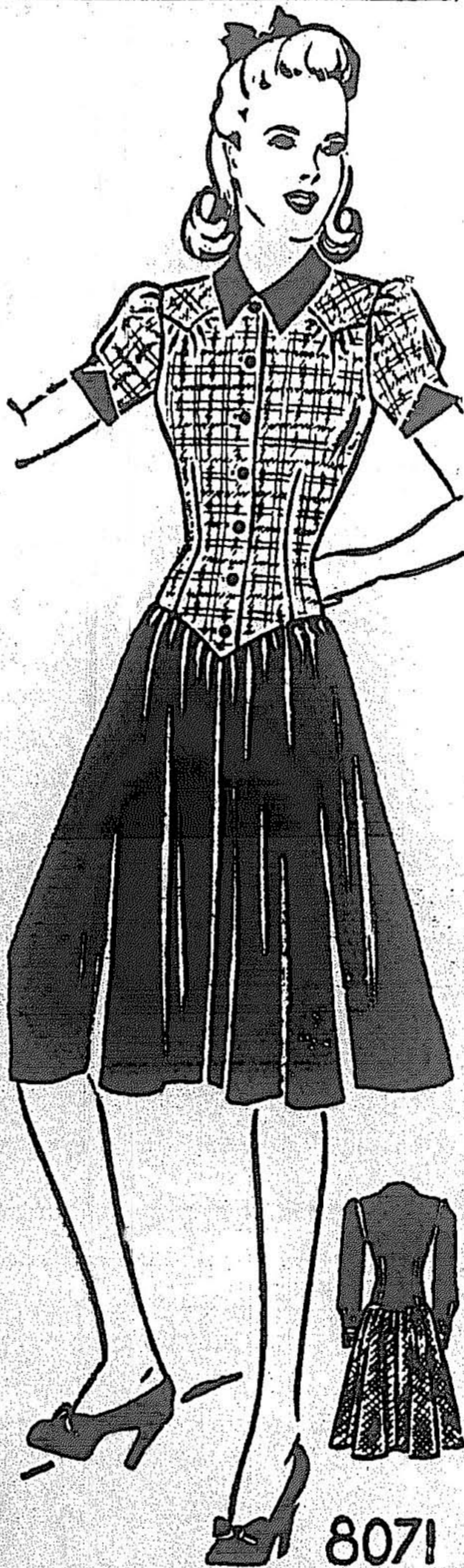
Mrs. Edna Moerschall reported that she called on Mrs. Margaret Mowatt in Woman's Hospital and found her cheerful but not able to return home for a while.
