

# A Verse for Scrap Book Contributed by Member

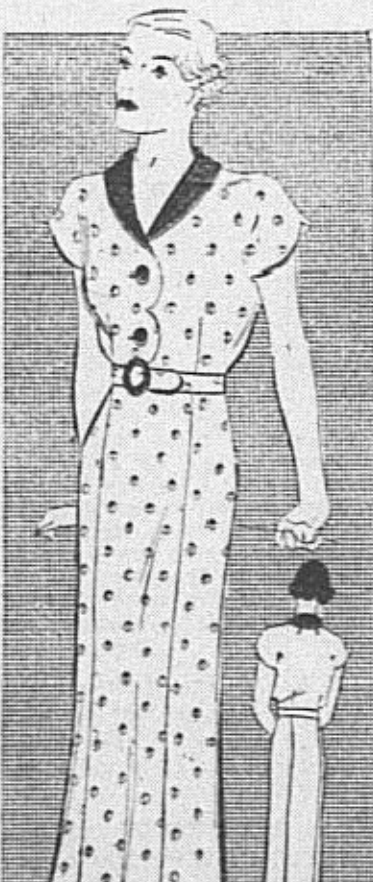
