Remove any excess fat from the ham and pass through a food chopper. Add mustard and pickle and moisten with mayonnaise to a spreading consistency. Combine the cheese with salt, chives and cream. When the tomato mixture is almost to the congealing consistency, pour a layer into a deep loaf pan which has been rinsed in cold water. Spread the ham mixture over when it has set enough not to mix. Cover with a second layer of the tomato and allow to set again. Add a layer of cheese and finally cover with the remaining tomato mixture. Chill, unmold and garnish with endive.

Sunday's Radio Dinner

- Chicken Soup with Avocado Grilled Ham
- New Potatoes and Peas in Cream
- Carrot and Almond Salad
- Meringue Torte

This menu may sound complicated, but it's easy to prepare. Use canned chicken broth as the base of the soup, and make the torte today.

Chicken Soup with Avocado

One can chicken soup, strained, 1 can consomme, 2 tablespoons cooking sherry, 1 avocado, whipped cream, chopped parsley.

Heat the soups together in a saucepan, add the sherry, and remove from the heat. Pour immediately over the avocado pear which has been peeled, diced, and placed in consomme cups, 1 teas-

watercress with additional mayonnaise on the side. Serves 4.

Meringue Torte

One cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon vinegar, 1 teaspoon water, 3 egg whites, ¼ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon cream of tartar.

Add the salt and cream of tartar to the egg whites and beat to a stiff foam. Add the sugar in ½ table-spoon portions alternately with the liquids, mixed together a few drops at a time. Beat until the sugar is dissolved and the mixture will pile well. Spread in a pie pan lined with plain, ungreased paper, or on an ungreased plate from which the dessert is to be served (the low temperature of the oven will not hurt the plate). Spread meringue to leave a rim around the edge to hold the fruit or ice cream. Bake in a very slow oven, 250 degrees, for 1 hour. Makes a torte 9 inches in diameter, to serve from 6 to 8.

To serve, fill the center with sliced or crushed fruit; a good combination would be peaches, apricots, pineapple, and bananas. Top the fruit with whipped cream, if you like, or with vanilla ice cream. For the easiest service, cut the meringue case into pieces for serving before adding the fruit.
