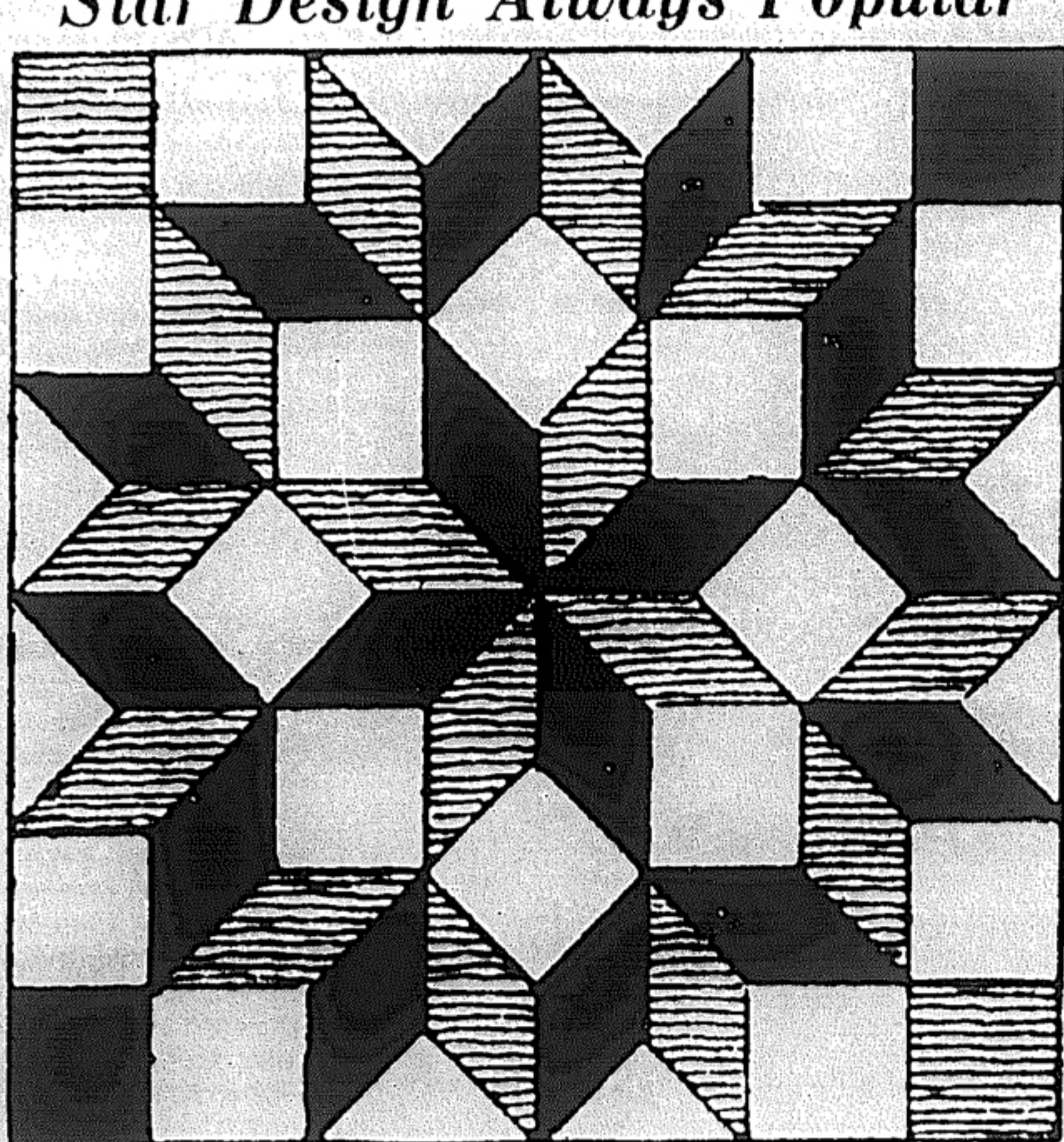

Several Ways Suggested to Set Block Together

ANYONE who likes a star pattern for a quilt will readily admit that this is just about the most attractive design of that type that she could possibly find.

It is an old, old pattern and sometimes called the "Eccentric Star;" but then, you know some of the old time patterns had as many as 13 different names.

There are only three kinds of patches in the whole block, a square, a triangle and a diamond and as you study it you will see that there appear to be cubes in the design as well as stars and star points.

YOU may use two colors of material and white for this pattern or you may use up all of your scraps and have all kinds and colors of cotton materials. This second
