Emma B. Hodge was my friend. A truly lovely gentlewoman in every meaning of the word. I was twenty years old, begin fling to awaken to beautiful things in the fields of needlework, art and china. Mrs. Hodge not only collected quilts for The Chicago Art Institute - she also collected Wedgewood for them.

She was elderly when I knew her. On Saturday afternoons when I finished at work I would take a street car to her home on the north side and visit her. She was a fascinating woman and an inspiration to me. She taught me so much and showed me how to appreciate the beauty of handwork and china in her collections.

I had little money back in 1928 but one day when I went to visit her in the early spring I took her a little bunch of violets. I still have the letter she wrote to me post-marked Mar. 2, 1928 and she wrote -

'You will never know how much joy they brought me, for I have been housed now so long, and I forgot and went with them to their home somewhere in the woods, or on some lonely road where love trod to get them, and that sufficed.'

Emma Hodge had a beautiful, sensitive mind and heart. She was a beautiful person.
