During these career years, mostly in New York, Miss Ickis wrote fifteen books. Most of them were leadership training books on recreation and arts and crafts. She says, with a chuckle, "The quilt book was the only one I really knew anything about" adding, "It's a very personal book -- it has some of my quilts and friends' quilts in it."

After her quilt book was published, she was asked to assist with the manuscript of Dorothy Brightbill's QUILTING AS A HOBBY. For that book Miss Ickis had the great pleasure of studying old textiles at the (then) Cooper Union Museum, developing a love for historic fabrics which has never left her. She has made a number of quilts from old fabrics she "rescued" from thrift shops.

"I've had nine lives -- every one of them different," says Marguerite Ickis with relish. "I'm on my ninth now." She is referring to her newest career, painting. The walls in her Cape cottage are covered with dozens of her paintings -- scenes from her childhood and youth in Ohio; her friends, her relatives, her self; incidents and activities from her farm heritage; the clothing of the early part of the century. All are lovely.

She still makes quilts. A "sort of a broken lily" she designed and made two years ago, and last year an applique dogwood from material from the "Ditty Box." When author, quiltmaker, teacher, editor, restaurant manager, farm daughter, botanist, researcher and, now, painter Marguerite Ickis says she's on her ninth life, she doesn't mean she has left eight behind her. She is bringing them all right along, in her teaching, her paintings and her quilts.

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Marguerite Ickis

Marguerite Ickis, author of the bestseller THE STANDARD BOOK OF QUILTMAKING AND COLLECT-ING, retired from the hurlyburly of New York City four years ago in her eightieth year. Now she lives on Cape Cod in a typical grey Cape Cod house with a steep Cape Cod stairway. Although she warns visitors about the stairway, Miss Ickis pays no attention to it herself as she leads the way upstairs to share some of her treasures: quilts she has made, quilts and old textiles she has collected. All her big New England beds are covered with quilts.

Tall, with beautiful white hair and twinkle in her eyes, Miss Ickis lives with the company of her canary, Tweetie Alexander. During the years in which she lived and taught in New York, she spent her summers on the Cape operating a restaurant, and she now has many friends there and a full social life. On Tuesdays, a sewing group meets at her house, and she occasionally organizes a quilting project for the group. She stays in touch with the quiltmakers on the Cape and with the owner of the quilt shop up the road. She regularly visits the antique shops in the area and the "Ditty Box" shop at the church for attic treasures which she is quick to recognize.

Although it is on nearly every quiltmaker's shelf, and in every quilt bibliography, THE STANDARD BOOK OF QUILTMAKING AND COLLECTING seems an unlikely book to be a best-seller. But, according to Rita Weiss, Crafts Editor for Dover Publishing Company, the book has been among their top best selling books not just for a few months, but for nineteen years! Dover first published the Ickis book in 1959, purchasing the rights from its original publisher who had gone out of business. Since then it has never been out of print, and is now a Dover best-seller in Europe as well as the United States.

Marguerite Ickis was born and raised in Ohio on a farm. Her grandmother and mother both made quilts, and so did Miss Ickis. She says she preferred designing them, and would often get her mother to help her with the more complicated piecing of sawtooth sets. Probably her favorite creation was a Jack and the Beanstalk applique design which included vines and flowers. She made two of them, but both were stolen.

Miss Ickis received her Bachelor's degree from Ohio University, and in 1929 went to New York where she earned a Master's degree in botany at Columbia University. For five years she was Curator of Botany at the Massachusetts Agricultural College, and then joined the staff of the National Girl Scouts in New York City where she was a Leader of Training in Nature and Arts and Crafts. Later she became Assistant Editor of RECREATION magazine and Dean of the Recreation Training School for the WPA, and then returned to Columbia to take the position of Instructor in Recreation.
