The Sixth Annual Southern Quilt Symposium was held at the Hunter Art Museum in Chattanooga, Tenn. April 17-19 and featured Log Cabin and String Quilts. Concurrently, an exhibit of those guilts was featured at the museum.

The hits of the exhibition were Michael James' Poppy Log Cabin, Maria McCormick-Snyder's stunningly innovative Log Cabin Variation, and the Chicken Wire quilt designed by the SQS '78 participants and finished by Billie Crumley.

Between eighty and ninety participants were feted with a tea and exhibit by the St. Paul's Quilters at a local Episcopal Church. The opening night program was a slide/lecture on "Log Cabin and String Quilts" by Pat Kyser, quilt teacher and writer from Alabama.

Michael James opened the second day with a slide/lecture on "Color and Design in Quilts", then the participants were divided into all-day workshops, "Color & Design in Quilts" by James, "New Dimensions in String Quilts" by Pat Kyser, and "Log Cabins" by Dot Brinkman, quilting teacher from Spartanburg, South Carolina.

The final day of the symposium consisted of a "Show & Tell" in which each participant introduced herself and shared a quilt or related item.

The outstanding feature of this particular symposium is its small, intimate nature. No commercial aspects permitted and there is a real sense of sharing of the kind done when quilters used to get together for quilting bees.

Participants come from all over the South and as far away as New York, Michigan, and Wisconsin. Included are teachers, professionals who are there in a private capacity, and many of the mainstream American quilters who quilt at home for their own enjoyment.

Bets Ramsey is the quiet powerhouse behind SQS. Calligrapher, award winning stitcher and quilter, Bets now devotes most of her time directing craft activities for a senior citizen center. She single handedly plans SQS each year. She works out all details (keeping costs phenomenally low) arranges for many participants to lodge with local quilters, and remains totally unflappable through it all. Plans for next years symposium center about Comforters, Clothes, and Containers. A by-invitation exhibition at the museum will feature quilt-related soft sculpture and Doris Hoover, formerly of Chattanooga and now a nationally known stitcher from Palo Alto, California will teach the main workshop. It is again planned for mid April when Tennessee is at its finest with pink and white dogwoods adding ethereal beauty to the countryside. A "Mystery" quilter with some of her quilts will be demonstrating her quilting at the af-fair.
