

The Providence records provide no dependable information about American economy quilts. The five quilts mentioned are expensive, probably imported, and probably in the English style of whole cloth quilts. The records do tell us that blankets were plentiful, relatively inexpensive, and readily available at home. Therefore, before 1729, quilts were neither a necessity nor an economy. Other motives must have been involved in their development.


print are throughout giving evidence that the fabric was bought specifically for the quilt.

The red is a turkey red with tiny yellow flowers whose two small leaves and short stem are black. The green is a medium leaf green with a black grid throughout but which is barely visible from over three feet.

This quilt was definitely intended for best as all appliqued units are padded including the stems of the wreaths! There doesn't appear to be any filler.

Sarah's quilting stitch is even and fine and the applique stitches on the roses and leaves barely visible even on inspection. Quilting in the blocks follows the wreath design with its leaves and flowers. The remaining open space is filled with IV' spaced diagonal lines. The border has quilting around the units as in the blocks and the 1/2" lines are scalloped with the curve of the border rather than a straight diagonal. The 1/2" edge binding is the turkey red print.

I happened on this treasure through word-of-mouth from another member of the Gennessee Valley Quilt Club, Lillian Bennett Spencer. So, talk up our rewarding craft and you'll be surprised at what there is to find."
