## Ash Proves Problem

## From The NORTHWEST QUILTERS' PATCHWORD

"With an active volcano in our own backyard, we deemed it a wise decision to cancel our annual summer picnic due to the amount of ash still on the grass and the plants and roadways.

With the ash blowing around on the summer wind it is difficult to leave windows open and have a clean house. One problem my daughter encountered was with the ash and clothing. Her son's white socks are not so white since walking on the carpet in the house after having the front door open on warm days. When washed, the socks are now gray not white. If this is the result of contact with ash on another surface, it would seem wise to assume if a window left open in the bedroom would allow ash on the carpet, it would also be left on any surface of the bed (namely QUILTS!) It is so fine it is not easy to see, but can be easily felt on anything it coats except fabrics.

I would caution those of you living in the "ash area" to be careful of leaving windows open near your quilts. This is the most unpredictable stuff I have ever seen. It is gray when dry, dark gray to black and even brown when wet, will not dissolve, is very hard to sweep or hose off anything, and just when you think you have it washed off just plain water, it dries and there it is again! Altho detergent washed it off well with fabric in my daughter's case. If anyone of you have any similar problems with the stuff, write and let us know so we can pass the word on to the rest of the concerned quilters.
