Re: Nomination of Bonnie Leman to the Quilter's Hall of Fame

Ask any quiltmaker which quilt magazine she takes and the chances are she will answer "QUILTER'S NEWSLETTER". There is no doubt that Bonnie Leman and her QUILTER'S NEWSLETTER have had a profound and lasting effect on the individual quiltmakers throughout the country as well as the quilt world in general.

To most of us, Bonnie Leman and the QUILTER'S NEWSLETTER are synonymous. Her name appeared as editor on the first masthead in 1969 and she has guided the magazine ever since, expanding and improving it with each year.

The first issue had 16 pages, classified ads were $35 \$$ a word, and the editor promised a "new and different kind of contest in every issue." Now the magazine has 48 pages, color photos, classified ads are $85 \$$ a word and it has 120,000 readers.

Bonnie wrote in her first editorial, "This QUILTER'S NEWSLETTER is the first edition and it is just a small sample of what is to come ... Geography prevents us from a real old fashioned quilting bee, but we can all get together through this magazine, chat and exchange ideas and news in a modern
quilting bee." I think Bonnie has done just that. We all feel she is a friend and through QN we keep in touch with each other just like the "modern quilting bee" she promised.

Back in 1969 before QN, the few quiltmakers and quilt lovers throughout the country felt isolated because they didn't know each other. Now thanks to Bonnie, there is a vast network of quilt lovers growing in number every year with quilt guilds, clubs and societies forming in large and small cities and towns throughout the nation.

Many of our foremost quilt "names" received national recognition through the platform provided in QN for their ideas and techniques.

In 1973 one of Bonnie's readers proposed a national quilting convention and even outlined a program. Since that time symposia have become an accepted event and one to which we look forward eagerly. It is highly unlikely that they would have reached this popularity without the support, encouragement and publicity from QN.

There are many of us who attribute the quilt boom of the '70s to the QUILTER'S NEWSLETTER because it built a solid, buying audience for the volume of books, magazines wrapping paper, greeting cards, patterns, shows and exhibits.

Through the years QN has been published many things stand out ... the pictures of
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## QUILTER'S HALL OF FAME

Hazel Carter, President of the Continental Quilting Congress, announced that no new members were named to the QUILTER'S HALL OF FAME for 1981. She said, "though all the nominations were of high quality, the Committee felt no individual nominated had attained quite the standards necessary to be eligible to be named to the Hall of Fame."

The Hall of Fame was instituted in 1979 with the names William Rush Dunton, Jr., Ruth Ebright Finley, Lenice Ingram Bacon, Marguerite Ickis, Jonathon Holstein and Gail van der Hoof. In 1980, Averil Colby, Anne Orr, Florence Peto, Grace Snyder and Bertha Stenge were honored.

The two new members serving on the Selection Committee for 1983-84 are Karey Bresenheim of Houston, Texas and Enola Gish of Baldwin, Kansas. They join Rachel Maines, Isobel Smith and Bets Ramsey. Retiring charter members are Joyce Gross and Mary Greenbaum.

Nominations for the 1982 Hall of Fame are closed, but the committee is now accepting nominations for 1983. Those wishing to nominate someone should send a 200 word statement describing the candidate's accomplishments to the field of quilting to PO Box 561, Vienna VA 22180 . The deadline is Jan. 1, 1983.
