

be turned tinder. They have been treated by a special process so that they will not fray.

SUELLEN MEYER RECEIVES AAUW GRANT

Suellen Meyer of St Louis has received a grant from the American Association of University Women for a project entitled "Design characteristics of Missouri-German quilts." She will be photographing quilts made before 1940 in communities on both sides of the Missouri River settled by Germans.

Her application for the grant was prompted by an article the Fall '81 JOURNAL (Vol 4 #3) entitled "Dearborn's Legacy from the Quiltmaker" written by Margaret Malayn who had earlier received a grant for a similar project from the AAUW.

"OLD GLORY" HIDES IN A QUILT

William Driver, a young sea captain from Salem, Mass is given credit for naming our flag "Old Glory".

When he was placed in command of the brig *Charles Doggett* in 1831, his fellow citizens came to wish him and his crew a good voyage. They gave him a United States Flag which Driver hailed as "Old Glory". He took the flag around the world twice and when he retired in 1837 he took Old Glory with him to Nashville. People soon came to know of his name for the flag.

In order to save the flag from Confederate troops during the Civil War, Driver hid it by having it sewn inside a bed guilt.

Union troops took Nashville back in 1862 and Driver brought the flag out of hiding and raised it over the state Capitol.

"Old Glory" was presented to the Smithsonian Institution in 1922
