AVERIL COLBY

AVERIL COLBY, born in Malton, Yorkshire, England in 1900, died Jan 4 1983.

"Averil Colby became interested in quilting through her local Women's Institute in the early 1930s. Although at the time she could not sew, but could only cut templates, she became involved with patchwork and eventually developed a career of making as well as writing about them. She is considered one of the top authorities on the history of patchwork and of quilting. *

Averil Colby was named to the Quilter's Hall of Fame in 1980.

GRACE BELL SNYDER

GRACE McCANCE SNYDER, born April 23, 1882 in Cass County, Missouri, died Dec 8, 1982 in North Platte, Neb.

Mrs Snyder was the subject of the well known book NO TIME ON HER HANDS and the slide and casette set THE THREE DREAMS OF GRACE McCANCE SNYDER.

Her award winning quilts have been pictured widely. In more recent years, the quilts have been exhibited by her daughter, Nellie Snyder Yost who flies around the country to guilds and symposiums lecturing about her mother with the quilts occupying the seat next to her.

Mrs Snyder is best known for her Flower Basket Quilt which is composed of 87,789 tiny triangles. The quilt will eventually go to the Nebraska State Museum so that it will always remain in Nebraska in accordance with her wishes.

Grace McCance Snyder was named to the Quilter's Hall of Fame in 1980.
