
The Prize-Winning Quilt Design

These will make a most acceptable gift stamped for embroidering, ready-cut and floss to complete, No. 325 may be had for 25 cents a set, or three sets for 65 cents.



Modernistic Star

The Modernistic Star

The Modernistic Star is the quilt illustrated in colors on the cover design of this book.

This original design typifies all that is lovely in today's trend in line and color, yet carries us back to the tranquil atmosphere of yesteryear. While many color combinations are possible the original block had a central star of deep blue with graceful rays of green and orange. The hexagons are cleverly joined with triangles.

As interesting as the block itself is the double border suggestion of green between narrow strips of orange with two groups separated by a white strip. The border is 14 inches wide. Cut the four orange strips 11,4 inches, the two green strips 3 1/2 inches and the white, 4 inches.

The blocks are set together in three rows. The outside rows have four blocks. The center row has three whole blocks with a half block at each end. The completed quilt measures 79 x 97 inches.

Note on the pattern the half triangle indicated by a long broken line. You will need eight of these to fill out the triangles on the ends of the quilt. Lay this half triangle on the fold of the material and cut 20 equal sided triangles. These are used to set the blocks together and fill in along the sides.

Each block is a hexagon when completed. The small white pieces (A) are sewed into the top of the long pointed pieces of green (C). The medium size white pieces (B) are joined to the orange or orchid pieces, (D) and these strips are sewed to the sides of the green pieces. The larger white pieces (E) join the groups thus formed. This makes a hexagon with a star-shaped opening in the center. The diamonds (F) are joined at the SHORTER edges and the star this makes is sewed into the opening. Or the hexagon could be placed in halves, making a straight seam through the middle.

You will need 2/3 of a yard of blue, 2 yards of green, 2 yards of orange and 4 yards of white.

This quilt would also be pretty in orchid, pink and green, or yellow, orange and green.

In the 1983 gift catalog from the Art Institute of Chicago are many items with a "cheerful Blue iris" design... adapted from an American bedcover, 1945". Though credit is not given the design is adapted from the "Blue iris" made and given to the museum by Dr Jeannette Dean Throckmorton. It is pictured in the catalog AMERICAN QUILTS FROM THE ART INSTITUTE OF CHICAGO, 1966. #59.329

Dr Jeannette Dean-Throckmorton was pictured on the cover and as the feature story of the Spring 1979 JOURNAL. An updated biographical sketch about her is published in the winter issue 1984 of LADYS' CIRCLE PATCHWORK QUILTS.

Four of Dr Throckmorton's quilts are in the collection of the Art Institute of Chicago. "The Modernistic Star" is in the Gross collection.

Dr Throckmorton loved to make quilts and apparently saved everything she could find that pertained to them. Her collection included many pattern books, the Art Institute of Chicago catalog, magazine pictures and articles and her own drawings and notations. We are indebted to her friends Ruth Rankin for saving the material and sharing it with us.

PRIZE WINNING DESIGNS is one of the pamphlets from her collection. Her copy is well worn and the edges are a little tattered. The article appearing on pg 17 is also from her collection.

The pamphlet PRIZE WINNING DESIGNS is undated. The name and address of the DES MOINES TRIBUNE is rubber stamped in a space on the cover. Note on page 17, the name and address listed is THE MODERN WOODMAN, Rock Island, Ill. This suggests that the pamphlet may have had wide distribution.

The colors Dr Throckmorton chose for her "Modernistic Star" are a variation of the suggested yellow, orange and green listed in the final paragraph. She made a notation in pencil at the bottom of the instructions, "Peach, yellow - bright, green - medium"

The pattern was cut from cardboard and carefully saved by inserting the pieces in an envelope and attaching the envelope to the page with pins.

Many of Dr Throckmorton's quilts have her name and the date she made the quilt in cording. "Modernistic Star" is inscribed at the top "Jeannette Anne Crapenhoft" and at the bottom center "Aunt Jeannette, 1943".
