OLD LINE TRADITIONS: Maryland Women & Their Quilts. DAR Museum Washington DC @1985.
Cover quilt in color. Soft back, 39 pgs.

The catalog, like the exhibit, focuses on the women who made the quilts so much of the text pertains to the quiltmaker. Each of the 31 quilts is pictured full.

Ms Allen found in her study of Maryland quilts that few survived from the 18th century although hundreds were recorded in estate inventories. The ones that survived from the early 19th century were usually from well-to-do households and made from new fabric purchased specifically for the quilt with decorative rather than utilitarian purposes in mind. They were therefore treasured, preserved and handed down in the families.

Gloria Allen, who did the study and curated the exhibit did some fine research for her Essay and the catalog. If you are following the state historical projects or are interested in the place of quilts in society, you will want this book. JG

Cathy Florence declares this is a book for dealers and collectors. I think it is is a book that any quilt lover will want because of the great number and variety of quilts pictured.

Ms Florence arranged the quilts chronologically from 1775-1984 with representatives from each period. In another section she has arranged the quilts by type.

One of the purposes of the book was to acquaint new collectors or dealers with what is available and at what price. I am sure that a general price guide is practical for our large country, but Ms Florence traveled some 25,000 miles and visited over 40 markets, shows, exhibits and museums in connection with her research always checking price as well as availability/ She says, "I gave it my best effort and I hope it will be of value to you."



This quilt is extraordinary! ...it was made for Charles Fisher (Fisher Body Works) of luxurious silks and satins and fabrics with spun gold threads...it's a double quilt, the gold satin trapunto worked backing being an entirely separate quilt...it was made by the Caden sisters of Lexington who ran a needlework shop in the Phoenix Hotel and enjoyed something of a national reputation for their superlative skills..."

In a telephone interview on Oct 22, 1985 Miss Fisher added she remembered going to the small shop of the Caden sisters on the second floor of the Phoenix Hotel when she was a young girl of 12 or 13. In 1927, when the senior Fishers purchased the Dixiana Farm, the Cadens were asked to make curtains for the entire house and quilts for each bed. The "Flower Garden" pictured above was made for the parent's bed and the twin "Feathered Stars" pictured on page 3 were made for Mary Fisher and her sister. At the time neither of the girls were impressed with the quilts and several years later all three were put away. The other quilts were made of cotton and were worn out through the years. The quilt is valued by Ms Florence at \$2500-\$3000.
