Authors and Editor

Carolyn O'Bagy Davis, a fourth-generation quilter, has written six books on western women and quilting history. She earned her B.A. in anthropology from the University of Arizona. She lectures and has curated traveling exhibits on Southwestern archaeology, Hopi Indian quilting, and pioneers of the American West. The quilting traditions of Native and Anglo women of the Southwest are the subject of ongoing research.

Judy Elsley was born and raised in England. She is a professor of English at Weber State University in Utah. She co-edited a book of academic essays about quilting, Quilt Culture: Tracing the Pattern (University of Missouri Press, 1994). Her revised Ph.D. dissertation, Quilts as Text(ile)s was published by Peter Lang Press (1996) and a book of personal essays, Getting Comfortable: A Woman in the West, was published by Jumping Cholla Press (1997).

Marilyn Goldman holds a B.A. in education and a M.S. in Social Sciences from Ball State University, where she was a Storer Scholar and received a National Science Foundation grant. She has worked as a journalist, teacher, and business executive. She teaches dancing, makes wearable art, and likes to research women's history in the area where she lives. She spent seven years studying the Wilkinson sisters.

Virginia Gunn, the editor of Uncoverings, has a M.S. in clothing and textiles and a Ph.D. in history. She is a professor of Clothing, Textiles,



and Interiors and the interim director of the School of Family and Consumer Sciences at the University of Akron in Ohio. Her research focuses on women's history and on nineteenth- and twentieth-century American textiles, costume, and decorative arts.

Melissa Jurenga is completing her Ph.D. at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln with an emphasis on historic textiles. She is a graduate research fellow of the International Quilt Study Center. Her background in history, education, and museum studies is regularly used in her research on quilts and quiltmakers associated with the James Collection.

Kim M. King, Ph.D., a sociologist, is an associate professor and currently chairperson of the Department of Sociology at Hiram College in Ohio. Kim is also an art quiltmaker. Her research and teaching interests include the social-historical aspects of quiltmaking, creativity and self-expression through quilts, family and youth studies, gender, and crime.

Connie Nordstrom is a lecturer, writer, teacher, and county fair judge and is past president of the San Juan Quilter's Guild. Her passion for antique quilts and the stories they tell began in childhood. As a quiltmaker and student of Americana, she focuses on studying and reproducing nineteenth-century American quilts. Her work has been featured in "Great American Quilts, 2002" and in a one-woman exhibit "Quilts, a Journey through Time," held at San Juan College, Farmington, New Mexico, in 2001.
