Mary Bywater Cross earned her B.A. at the University of Iowa in elementary education and library science. For the last two decades she has focused on quilts: designing and making woolen quilts, curating numerous quilt exhibitions, consulting, lecturing, and conducting workshops and retreats. She is especially known for her research on quilts of migration. Her work and exhibits have earned national awards and resulted in two books: Treasures in the Trunk: Quilts of the Oregon Trail (1993) and Quilts and Women of the Mormon Migrations: Treasures of Transition (1996).

Sarah Rose Dangelas grew up in New Hampshire and earned her bachelor's degree in art history at Boston's Northeastern University, where she found time to make two quilts, which began her interest in quilt history. Sarah is currently a Ph.D. student in the American Studies program at the University of Maryland. She lives on Block Island, Rhode Island, where she is working on her dissertation. She is interested in historic preservation and the presentation of women's history at historic sites.

Carolyn Ducey, a native Nebraskan with a M.A. in art history from Indiana University, is curator of the International Quilt Study Center at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln where she is also working on her Ph.D. in textile history. She has organized numerous exhibitions for IQSC. She co-authored Masterpiece Quilts from the James Collection (1998) and contributed to A Flowering of Quilts (2001) and Wild by Design: Two Hundred Years of Innovation and Artistry in American Quilts (2003).

Mary Ellen Ducey serves as University Archivist/Special Collections Librarian at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Libraries. She obtained a masters of library science from Indiana University in Bloomington and a masters in history from the University of South Dakota. Mary Ellen also teaches archival management courses for the Museum Studies graduate program at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Blaire O. Gagnon taught herself to quilt after her daughter was born and soon opened a quilt shop in Salem, Connecticut. After her family moved to Rhode Island, she returned to college and earned a master's degree in textiles, fashion merchandising, and design at the University of Rhode Island, completing her thesis on Egyptian appliques in 2002. She is now working on a doctorate in cultural anthropology at the University of Connecticut, focusing on cross-cultural impacts on textile development and marketing.

Virginia Gunn, the editor of Uncoverings, has a M.S. in clothing and textiles and a Ph.D. in history. She is a professor of Clothing, Textiles, and Interiors in the School of Family and Consumer Sciences at The University of Akron in Ohio, where she teaches courses on history of costume and fashion, the history of interior design, and material-culture studies. Her publications focus on quilts and coverlets.

Marin F. Hanson, assistant curator of the International Quilt Study Center, holds undergraduate degrees from Grinnell College and Northern Illinois University and a M.A. degree in textile history, quilt studies emphasis, and museum studies from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. She recently curated the IQSC exhibition "Reflections of the Exotic East in American Quilts" and authored the accompanying catalog (2001). Her scholarly work also focuses on the use of databases in facilitating broad-scale quilt research.

Jannehen Smucker holds a M.A. in textile history, quilt studies emphasis, with a minor in museum studies from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. She recently co-authored Amish Crib Quilts from the Midwest: The Sara Miller Collection (2003) and curated the exhibition "At the Crossing: Midwestern Amish Crib Quilts and the Intersection of Cultures," sponsored by IQSC. Her research interests center on intercultural themes with particular focus on Anabaptist history and Amish and Mennonite quilts and quiltmakers.

Heather Ersts Venters, a native of Maryland, is curator for the Historic Annapolis Foundation. Prior to this, she was exhibition coordinator at the Maryland Historical Society in Baltimore, organizing numerous exhibitions including "Maryland in Focus: A Photographic History, 1839-2000," and "Wallis: Duchess of Windsor." Heather graduated with honors from the masters program in the History of American Decorative Arts offered by Parsons School of Design and The Smithsonian Associates and holds a M.A. in history from George Mason University.
