She curated "Visual Systems: The Quilter's Eye," an exhibition of quilts from the International Quilt Study Center collection. As an intern and a volunteer at the Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum in Decorah, Iowa, Derrick examined and researched their collection of approximately 110 quilts.

VIRGINIA GUNN is a professor of Clothing, Textiles, and Interiors in the School of Family and Consumer Sciences at the University of Akron in Ohio. She teaches course on the history of costume and fashion, the history of interior design, and material culture studies. She holds a B.S. in Home Economics Education from Kansas State University, an M.S. in Applied Art from Syracuse University, and Ph.D. in History from the University of Akron. She is a past president (1990–1993) and board member (1984–1994) of the American Quilt Study Group, and she edited *Uncoverings* from 1994 to 2003. Her publications focus on quilts, coverlets, and women's history.

LAUREL HORTON is an independent quilt researcher, author, and editor. A native of Kentucky, she holds a B.A. in English and an M.S. in Library Science from the University of Kentucky and an M.A. in Folklore from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. Her 1979 thesis, "Economic Influences on German and Scotch-Irish Quilts in Antebellum Rowan County, North Carolina," was one of the earliest studies of regional variations in American quiltmaking traditions. She authored the award-winning book, Mary Black's Family Quilts: Memory and Meaning in Everyday Life. A member of AQSG since 1982, she edited Uncoverings from 1987 through 1993, and resumed editorship with the 2008 volume.



LINDA McShannock has served as collections curator at the Minnesota Historical Society since 1995. She holds a B.S. in Fashion Merchandising from the University of Minnesota, and an M.A. in Textile History/Quilt Studies from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Her research into the profession of dressmaking will be published in a forthcoming volume of *Minnesota History*. She is a former president and board member of the Textile Center, a member of the Costume Society of America, and a member of AQSG.

SHARON FULTON PINKA is an independent quilt researcher. A native of Ohio, she holds a B.S.Ed. in English from Ohio University, and an M.S. in Educational Media from Bowling Green State University (Ohio). Pinka retired as a junior high English teacher/librarian where she edited a three-volume student-produced local history book. She has a strong interest in Ohio history, antiques, woven coverlets, and quilts, and serves as a trustee for the Richland County Museum. Her article "Embroidered Summer Spreads" appeared in *Blanket Statements*, Issue 94.

LINDA PUMPHREY holds an A.A. from Cottey College, a B.S. from University of Southern Illinois, and an M.B.A. from University of Denver. She is employed by Buffalo Batt, division of Polyester Fibers, LLCTM, where she is National Sales Manager for the Mountain Mist® brand of quilt batting and products. Having joined the Mountain Mist® team in 1989, she promotes the brands and develops national marketing programs and new quilting-related products. She has served on the boards of the International Quilt Study Center, the International Quilt Association, the American Quilt Study Group, and Ohio Quilts. She currently serves on the advisory board for Quilts Inc. and as co-president of The Alliance for American Quilts. As a quiltmaker, she proudly carries on a family tradition that goes back at least four generations.
